The driving force behind this report is ensuring that **representation of women and Black, Indigenous, and People of Color** is present in (1) decision-making bodies, (2) policies that are drafted and passed, and (3) support/investment in organizations that center racial and gender justice.

WHERE WE GO FROM HERE

Increase state-level funding for domestic violence and sexual assault programs and provide emergency support for child welfare in line with federal CARES Act funding.

Achieve universal healthcare coverage by expanding Medicaid and protecting public health. Ensure that coverage includes mental health services.

North Carolina is **one of 12 states that has not expanded Medicaid.**

Women enrolled in Pregnancy-Related Medicaid are dis-enrolled when they deliver, leaving them without coverage at a critical postpartum moment.

Invest in the care economy:

- prioritize affordable childcare
- adequately protect and compensate essential workers, including women and specifically childcare providers and educators (pre-K-12)
- mandate paid family leave

In North Carolina, childcare can cost more than tuition for an in-state public college.

In North Carolina, women and Black, Indigenous, and people of color represent a disproportionate share of essential workers.
